RURAL WELLBEING

Migration & Immigration Factsheet

HIGHLIGHTS

- 6% of migrants to rural areas moved from other Canadian provinces or territories.
- Urban areas have a higher proportion of migrants from other countries.
- Approximately 60% of immigrants in rural areas were born in Europe, while 55% of immigrants in urban areas were born in Asia.
- 50% of immigrants in rural areas arrived prior to 1980.

Overview - What do demographic statistics tell us?

Census data helps us understand population changes. We can examine how many people moved to a different location within Canada, and how many immigrants moved to Canada from other countries. This factsheet presents migration and immigration statistics for rural and urban municipalities in Ontario. Summary statistics for census divisions and economic regions are presented in the appendices. Definitions:

<u>Rural</u>: any municipality outside of census metropolitan areas.



Urban: any municipality within a <u>census metropolitan area</u>.

Municipality: Census subdivisions, municipalities, and areas treated as municipal for statistical purposes, including unorganized territories and Indigenous reserves and settlements.

<u>Migrants</u>: people who moved to a different census subdivision between May 21, 2020, and May 21, 2021. Internal migrants moved from elsewhere within Canada. External migrants moved from outside of Canada.

Immigrants: landed immigrants or permanent residents who have been granted the right to live in Canada permanently by immigration authorities on or prior to May 11, 2021. This also includes immigrants who have obtained Canadian citizenship by naturalization.

Canadian citizen: people who are citizens of Canada.

<u>First generation</u>: people who were born outside of Canada.

Second generation: people born in Canada with at least one parent born outside of Canada.

Third generation: people born in Canada with both parents born in Canada.

Migration

Urban and rural areas have a similar proportion of migrants (Table 1). Almost all of the migrants in rural areas came from elsewhere within Ontario (Table 2). Only 6% of migrants to rural areas moved from other Canadian provinces or territories. Urban areas have a higher proportion of migrants from other countries.

Immigration

Urban areas have a much higher proportion of immigrants than rural areas (Table 1). About half of the immigrants in rural areas arrived prior to 1980 (Table 3). In contrast, almost half of immigrants in urban areas arrived in Canada between 2001-2021. One quarter of urban immigrants arrived in the last 10 years, compared to only 13% in rural areas.



Almost 60% of immigrants in rural areas were born in Europe, while 55% of immigrants in urban areas were born in Asia (Table 4). Rural and urban areas have a similar proportion of immigrants who were born in the Americas.

Rural areas have more third generation Canadians, which makes sense since many rural immigrants arrived more than 40 years ago (Table 5). Most urban immigrants are recent arrivals, so urban areas are home to more first generation and second generation Canadians than rural areas.

Summary

Population change can be both beneficial and challenging for a community. For example, population increases may help address labour shortages, but could also result in higher housing prices and a greater demand for municipal services. Both migration from within Canada and immigration from outside of Canada are important for maintaining a productive workforce. Rural areas are aging and have a smaller proportion of recent immigrants, which may affect the labour market. Understanding population change is important for municipal planning and workforce development. Businesses, community organizations, and governments can use the information provided in this factsheet and in the dashboard to help develop strategies for attracting people to move to rural communities.
